CULTIVATING CHRIST-CENTERED LEADERSHIP IN CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

eadership. Every pastor, principal, parent, and politician seems to mention it incessantly. Leadership carries so much weight and contributes significantly to seemingly every outcome in life. Some emphasize the need for it at the top. Others place the emphasis on it needing to be student-centered. Regardless, the need for leadership in our society is undeniable. We NEED leadership. We need to be led. An honest look at human history makes that fact abundantly clear.

In a Christian school that truth remains steadfast. However, the primary source of that leadership is not in the administration, the faculty, or the student council. Although each of these entities carry high levels of influence, to produce lasting fruit, their guidance must originate from a deeper and more powerful source. In a Christian environment, leaders must be led. Led by His Spirit - the Spirit of God that dwells in each of us that know Jesus Christ as Savior. Without it, our efforts will eventually be stultified.


Spirit-led schools, churches, and individuals will have trademark characteristics that distinguish them from a world that knows not the presence of God within themselves. A survey of Scripture allows for the following attributes to emerge as evidence of this leading of the Holy Spirit.

SPIRIT-LED SCHOOLS ARE CHRIST-CENTERED.

Our Savior promised His followers that He would not leave them without His presence. That presence and comfort is found in the indwelling Holy Spirit. Christ's words in John 14:26 remind us that the leadership of the Holy Spirit will always result in Jesus being magnified: "But the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, whom the Father will send in my name, he shall teach you all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you." As a school led by His spirit, we continually must bring to remembrance the clear teaching of our Lord and Savior. This is practically lived out by beginning each class in prayer, spending time studying the Scriptures daily, and teaching every subject through a biblical worldview.

SPIRIT-LED SCHOOLS PRODUCE DISCIPLES.

The account of the conversion of the Ethiopian man in Acts 8 provides a fascinating case study of what it looks like to be led by His Spirit. At the prompting of the Holy Spirit, Philip, a committed follower of Christ, is directed to guide an individual searching for truth. This Ethiopian man needed a guide, a mentor, and the Spirit led Philip to be that discipler for the searching soul. As a Christian school, we strive to produce committed followers of Christ. This is the product of spirit-filled men and women who live out 2 Timothy 2:2, "And the things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also." This sort of



mentorship is a regular part of the rhythm at LBS, where positive and influential teacher-student relationships are part of the fabric of our institution.

SPIRIT-LED SCHOOLS REMAIN COMMITTED TO BIBLICAL PRINCIPLES.

Stated simply, Spirit-led schools manifest the fruit of the Spirit. "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, Meekness, temperance: against such there is no law." (Galatians 5:22-23) These essential attributes of the spirit-filled life will be found in any organization led by His Spirit. The development of these traits is recognized and applauded at LBS through special chapels dedicated to highlighting the spiritual growth and development in these areas.

For 36 years Lancaster Baptist School has endeavored to be "Led by His Spirit" in hiring faculty, selecting curriculum, and establishing policies. Many of these choices may seem quixotic to the natural man, but in each our mission

has remained steadfast. The mission of LBS is to assist parents in educating and equipping their students to develop a heart for God, to cultivate a sound biblical worldview, and to prepare students to positively impact their families, churches, communities, and country for Jesus Christ. This spiritual mission demands the leading of His Spirit continually.

THE USE OF THEMES IN ELEMENTARY AND HIGH SCHOOL CHAPEL

ancaster Baptist School establishes Christlike character most emphatically in weekly chapels. The elementary students have chapel every Thursday and the secondary students meet each Tuesday and Thursday to hear God's Word preached by a faculty or staff member of the West Coast Baptist College or Lancaster Baptist Church. In the secondary chapel, the singing and preaching focuses on a theme set by the administration at the beginning of the year. Character First, a program that helps primary school students develop honesty, courage, and other positive qualities, is being implemented in elementary chapels through singing, stories, and preaching. Each month, the teachers select several students in their classes to recognize at the "character awards chapel." Through theming and recognition of character in chapel, LBS is taking positive steps to establish Christ-like character.

"And he left all, rose up, and followed Him." This description of Levi, the publican-turned-disciple of the Lord Jesus, encapsulates the vision for the students at Lancaster Baptist School this year. The theme, called "All in on Jesus," focuses on various aspects of the Christian life and how the students can be "all in" through that discipline. In August, the first theme simply encouraged students to be, "all in on Jesus because of salvation." In September, students learned to be "all in on worship" leading to the October emphasis, "all in on Jesus through His Word". November was all about abandoning negative influences, citing Acts 19:19 in a monthly theme called, "All in on Jesus by burning the books". In December, students enjoyed the emphasis on being "all in on Jesus through celebrating" as Christ's birth was remembered at each service. January was all about listening, as Jesus taught in Luke 11:28, and February, the current theme, focuses on the joy of giving

spoken about by Jesus in Luke 6:30.

In elementary chapel, students studied various character traits along with an animal that exemplifies that characteristic. In August, the students learned about diligence using the beaver as an example. September was all about initiative, and the swan helped communicate the importance of leadership. In October, the students thoroughly enjoyed learning all about thoroughness, and how important details are to alligators. The wolf taught the students about respect in November, then the difficult lesson of patience in December using the characteristics of the butterfly. Of course, God's Word is the focus of every single chapel, and elementary students start each service by singing, "I want to do right and be like Jesus. I want to get smart and serve others. I love my parents, Pastor, teachers, and America; but, most of all, I want to glorify my Lord!"

At LBS, chapel is an integral part of the week. Whether the students are hearing preaching, enjoying split sessions, or being recognized for Christian character, God's Word is at the forefront and the power to change lives is always the focus. While themes and songs about animals are fun for the students, these elements simply serve the focal point of chapel: the preached Word of God. By His grace, and through His help, the students of LBS will experience the true establishment of Christ-like character as a result of God's Word.

offering biblically based curriculum that emphasize mastery of foundational concepts in reading, language arts, and arithmetic in our elementary program. In our secondary program, we build on these principles to encourage advanced reasoning and application.

We believe that academic excellence should be measurable. Therefore, we continually evaluate our progress through standardized testing. While tests do not capture the entirety of a student's success, they provide valuable insights into our students' achievements and areas for growth. Throughout the academic year, we conduct benchmark testing to monitor progress and identify where additional support may be needed.

Students participate in the Northwest Education Association's Measures of Academic Progress Test (MAP Test), a nationally recognized standardized assessment. These tests allow us to compare our students' performance against national averages, providing an objective measure of our program's effectiveness. Over the past two years, many of our students have scored above average, highlighting the strength of our curriculum and the quality of our teaching. Lancaster Baptist School has consistently excelled in language arts scoring school-wide in the 69th percentile and is continually improving in mathematics scoring in the 58th percentile.

CULTIVATING WELL-ROUNDED CHRISTIAN LEADERS AT LANCASTER BAPTIST SCHOOL

any parents want their children to receive a well-rounded Christian education. At Lancaster Baptist School, one of the five Eagle Attributes that define our school is "Growing Comprehensively". This alludes to

the fact that we desire to see students develop holistically; specifically, we want to impact their entire being. The renowned author of the Seven Laws of Learning, John Milton Gregory, said, "The true function of the teacher is to create the most favorable conditions for self-learning." Regarding comprehensive growth, Lancaster Baptist School desires to create an environment for young people to grow their mind, body, heart, and soul in order to develop their God-given talents.

As a school, a fundamental goal is developing students' minds. Romans 12:2 states, "And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God." Our core curriculum - Bible, language, math, history, science, and foreign language - focuses on knowledge acquisition with a Biblical worldview. Additional learning opportunities are also geared to cultivating the mind through hands-on experiences such as field trips and projects like English research papers, investigative science, and history presentations. Mind development lays a foundation for further learning.

Part of comprehensive learning also includes physical fitness and skill development. We emphasize physical education classes which focus on calisthenics, stamina, and various sports. In the elementary program, a mixture of fun and competitive activities are used to develop motor skills and coordination. In the secondary program, there is more focus on conditioning and sports instruction. Students are also encouraged to participate in extracurricular athletics such as cheerleading, volleyball, football, basketball, golf, cross country, and baseball, providing opportunities to develop physically while working with others on a team. Physical growth is an important component of being a well-rounded student.

A common saying is, "The heart of the matter is a matter of the heart." We desire to appeal to a student's heart - the core of their being - using creative venues. Some of these venues include art class, music courses, and a Fine Arts competition. The music program provides vocal and instrumental instruction. For vocal training, classes include ensemble and choir, and instrumental training classes consist of orchestra and band. Art classes provide a needed outlet for students to draw, paint, sculpt or craft. To give students an opportunity to showcase their skills, we promote participation in a Fine Arts competition. This is an event for students to display their talents in music, speech, and art while competing against students from other schools. The heart or emotional being of a student is important and requires development.



Although it is often overlooked, the soul, the spiritual component, is the most important part of a person. The highest achievement of a student is spiritual growth, which requires daily attention. As a Christian school, we recognize its importance and emphasize Biblical truth through daily Bible classes, weekly chapels, Biblical integration, service opportunities, and prayer focus. Our desire is to saturate our curriculum with Biblical teaching, pray for receptive hearts, and provide opportunities for students to act on truths learned. These components work together to provide an environment conducive for spiritual growth.

Many parents desire for their children to receive a well-rounded Christian education with the hope that their children will become versatile Christian adults. To achieve this requires attention on every part of a person's being - the mind, heart, body, and soul. At Lancaster Baptist School we continue striving to train Christian leaders who are growing comprehensively so they can use their ability to impact the world for Christ.

Our LBS girls' volleyball team honored Alana and her family before the Eagles' home opener on that Thursday evening. The gym was filled to capacity as the LBS community watched new jerseys with her initials on the sleeve being debuted, and a special #5 jersey retired in her honor. The coaching staff and volleyball teams had raised funds to purchase these new uniforms. Along with this, Alana's family was presented with her jersey worn last year as a captain of her JV team.

Her JV coach, Jessica Averbeck, had this to say about Alana - "Alana exuded strength, joy, and leadership both on and off the court. As a volleyball captain, she inspired her teammates with her unwavering determination and focus. Her passion for volleyball was infectious, and she would strive to bring out the best in those around her. Her contagious laugh and radiant smile had a way of lifting spirits and creating an atmosphere of joy. Whether on the volleyball court or in her daily interactions, Alana's strong leadership, faith in Jesus, and contagious laugh

left an enduring legacy. She was a true inspiration, leaving a lasting imprint on the hearts of all who knew her."

While volleyball was a huge part of Alana's life, it was not the main focus of her life. Alana's focus was her relationship with her Lord Jesus Christ, and the Lady Eagles' goal for this season was to continue that legacy. The Eagles' coaching staff designed a gospel tract to distribute to all the visiting teams this season. The tract was then attached to a Gatorade and handed to every visiting player, coach, and referee at the conclusion of each game. Many coaches expressed their gratitude and told our coaches how it had made a lasting impact on their team. One result of this gesture was that multiple teams wanted to honor Alana on their home court when the Lady Eagles traveled to play them. In one game, the opposing team gave each of our girls a pink hair ribbon and a flower, read a tribute about Alana, and then had a moment of silence to honor her. In another instance, one referee was so touched by Alana's legacy that he donated to the purchase of the new uniforms.

Although Alana is no longer with us, her memory and legacy will live on through the lives of her teammates and coaches. We are so thankful for Alana's lasting impact on each of us and look forward to sharing her testimony to point others to Christ.

bow, place the shoulder rest with a slight tilt on the back side of the instrument, and tune each of the violin's four strings with precision, ensuring they are perfect. This routine has become familiar as I prepare to play my violin in the Lancaster Baptist Church orchestra. These Sunday morning orchestra practices are more than just normal rehearsals: they are about preparing to worship the Lord through music in a way that resonates far beyond the notes I play in this orchestra. While the preparation might go unnoticed by most, each rehearsal ensures that my performance is the best for the Lord. Church orchestra is one of the few ways I can use my talents to serve God, which all starts with the twisting of a violin peg and the stroking of the bow to perfection.

At Lancaster Baptist School, students are given many opportunities, like playing in the church orchestra, to make an impact by serving others and worshiping the Lord in serving others. 



BUILDING BLOCKS FOR THE FUTURE

recent interaction with a four year old here at Kids' Corner further demonstrated the fascinating interweave of various areas of the development of the young brain. The student

was not her usual chipper self. Intent on being available for the child's needs, a teacher gave the reassurance of her presence. The student was saddened to discover that a dear pet fish had passed away the night before, causing the devastation. The following morning, the girl came to school a little less morose, and was more of her cheerful self.

Many studies have shown and proven the benefits of early childhood education. One of which is the development of interpersonal skills to help the child navigate the intricacies of social interaction. Here at Kids' Corner, we value the importance of a child's social-emotional competencies; and we adhere to what the Bible says on how to relate to one another. Our preschool is open from 7:30AM up to 5:30PM Mondays through Fridays all year round. Our students spend extended periods of time with teachers and children outside of their families. This environment provides plenty of opportunities to learn to build friendships, resolve conflicts, and exercise selfregulation. We teach our students the Word of God through our daily Bible lessons. Our students learn through many teachable moments and practical application in day-to-day classroom settings. Each is a work in progress, but they have developed good conduct in class, shown kindness by taking turns in playground activities, and displayed responsibility by cleaning up after themselves.

An important pillar of every educational institution is the training and experience of its staff. The teachers at Kids' Corner love the Lord, and love the students and our families. The young girl whose pet was gone understood that her teacher would listen and would know how she was feeling because that is what she experiences on a daily basis. We use the ABeka Preschool program as our curriculum. Teachers from the K-2, K-3, and K-4 classes utilize the materials well and supplement the program with crafts, worksheets, and manipulatives to reinforce the concepts presented in the books. Our teachers

go above and beyond what is required of them. That passion and dedication are reflected in the relationships that have been built with the families in the preschool.

Structure is immediately visible in the preschool classrooms. The teachers have designed the students' learning environment to not only be educational, but engaging and fun. Children of preschool age require structure to perform well within the boundaries of safety and careful planning. Our teachers have provided that guidance in their classes.

Kids' Corner aims for every student to be equipped for grade school. Our investment in the students' education is evidenced by our former students' percentile ranking in this fall's MAP Testing at LBS.

The city of Lancaster has worked with KCP to extend our goals and vision to the community. This year, we are granted 10 vouchers to help single-parent households pay for their preschooler's monthly tuition. We give free tours to parents who are interested in learning about our program. Of greater importance to academic excellence is our desire that our students come to know who Jesus is and grow to be like Him. In Proverbs 22:6, we are instructed to "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it." Kids' Corner Preschool, under the ministry of Lancaster Baptist Church, is an ideal training ground for your preschooler.
