their child's experience with public education. God began to convict us that we should not put our children under government control.

## CHRISTIAN EDUCATION HAS THE RIGHT VIEW ON SCIENCE.

God created everything (Genesis 1:1; Colossians 1:16). If evolution is true, as the public school promotes, then Adam and Eve were not real people and the teachings of Scriptures are not accurate (Luke 3:38). This will cause doubt and confusion in Christian young people.

## CHRISTIAN EDUCATION TEACHES THE CORRECT FACTS OF HISTORY.

History shows God's hand in world events (Romans 15:4). The study of history in a Christian context provides students with heroes to emulate and goals to fulfill by focusing on the individuals whose character, creativity, initiative, and hard work have made a positive impact on American and world history in general (Hebrews 11).

## CHRISTIAN EDUCATION TRAINS CHILDREN In Proper Critical Thinking Skills (1 Corinthians 2:16).

Children in public schools are taught to reason using facts that are either unbiblical or slanted toward a world view. The working of the Holy Spirit in decision making is not taught.

## CHRISTIAN EDUCATION DOES NOT CONFORM TO THE WORLD'S VIEW.

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## **Biblical Training** MENTORING YOUR CHILD IS NOT A PART-TIME JOB

wife and I had been married about two years when her pastor who had married us asked me to come and preach an eight-day revival meeting. After the last service he pulled me aside

and said some nice things about my preaching. His countenance became very serious however, and I will never forget his challenge to me. He said, "John, I appreciated every message, but I would have thought that in a series of twelve messages, you would have preached at least once on the family."

I chuckled slightly and said, "Pastor, that's your job! You've been in ministry for two decades and have raised some great kids." His next words pierced my heart as he held his Bible in front of me. "Our authority to preach on the home comes from God's Word. You have just as much responsibility to preach on it as I do."

No one is an expert on raising children because most of us are still raising children regardless of their ages or ours. It is a life-long process and a full-time responsibility. None of us can know if we have been successful until both our lives and theirs are over. While we can learn from the example of others, it is wise to focus on the instruction that God gave us in His Word.

Deuteronomy 6:6-9 is a template on mentoring children. This passage was called the "Shema" by the Jewish people from which we get our word "schematic." It is a pattern for parents who seek to bring up their children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. "And these words, which I command thee this day, shall be in thine heart: And thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up. And thou shalt bind them for a sign upon thine hand, and they shall be as frontlets between thine eyes. And thou shalt write them upon the posts of thy house, and on thy gates."

While the key component of this process is "these words," the emphasis is on the constant and consistent declaration and display of God's Word. As parents, we fall into the trap of compartmentalizing the Bible to a few hours at church each week or perhaps a few minutes of "family altar" in our homes each day. The rest of the time our children are being spoiled "through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ" (Colossians 2:8).

Now God is certainly in favor of the formal preaching and teaching of the Bible. Scripture would support that practice to the fullest. The Lord knows however, that it is through the informal settings that Truth has its greatest impact on our children. When we can take an incident or circumstance in our child's life and apply biblical teaching to provide comfort, challenge, conviction or change, a lasting impression is made. Jesus Himself gives us this example over and over as in the middle of a temptation or crisis, His response was, "Have ye not known?" or "It

is written," or "Moses and the prophets...." He was always directing His follower's hearts back to the Word of God.

Growing up on a dairy farm, things did not

always go exactly as planned. Yet in the midst of machinery breaking down or cows getting out of the fence or the weather not cooperating with our plans, I never heard my dad curse or complain. Instead, he would quote a verse from the Bible or sing a verse of a hymn or take the situation to the Lord in prayer. When decisions needed to be made or discipline administered to one of us kids, it was always in the context of God's Word.

We will never be able to pass the Word of God on to our children in those critical moments if we as dads are not saturated ourselves with Truth. We cannot teach what we ourselves have not learned.

# 5 Ways to Help Your Children Walk in the Truth

## NE OF THE EASY TRAPS FOR PARENTS TO FALL INTO IS HAVING SHORTSIGHTED GOALS FOR THEIR CHILDREN.

- If I can just make it through today... (particularly in the preschool years)
- My child's greatest problem is to change
   \_\_\_\_\_\_ behavior.
- If he can just make a higher grade...
- If she could just have more friends... While it is good to make it through another day,

and behavior, grades, and friends do matter, 3 John 4 gives one of the greatest goals any Christian parent can hold: "I have no greater joy than to hear that my children walk in truth." This is a long-term goal–that your children would set a lifelong direction of walking in the truth.

By the grace of God, Terrie and I can personally attest to the joy of having children who not only walk with the Lord, but are actively pursuing Him and serving Him. We thank the Lord that all four of our adult children are loving and serving the Lord with their spouses.

What helps set the direction for your children on the path of walking in the truth? Here are a few things we've learned over the years through our family life and through counseling hundreds of other families.

### 1. HAVE A SPIRITUAL RELATIONSHIP WITH YOUR CHILDREN.

I believe you should have fun with your children. You should play games and have family days and talk about what's going on at school.

However, realize that your children don't just need you to be their friend. They need you to be their parent. They need you to be a spiritually nurturing authority in their lives.

It should not be abnormal to your children for you to talk about spiritual things—to ask them what they learned in church, how their walk with God is, how they're doing in resisting temptation. Ask your teen, "What is God teaching you lately?"

When I was in high school, my mom was so good at this. She would come to my room in the evening while I was doing my homework and just ask me about my day, tell me she was praying for me, and sometimes share a Scripture verse with me. Those moments—not so much individually, but accumulated—made a profound impact on my life.

And these words, which I command thee this day, shall be in thine heart: And thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up.—Deuteronomy 6:6–7

## 2. KNOW YOUR CHILDREN'S FRIENDS.

Influence is a powerful force. Your children's friends can be a tremendous force—either for positive or for negative. So make it your business to know who is influencing them and what they are like.

When our children were still at home, I was a little bit like an FBI

agent when it came to who their friends were. I wanted to know who was influencing my children and how. So it mattered to me what their friends listened to, talked about, thought was funny or cool, and (if I allowed our children to go to their houses) what their homes were like.

No children are perfect—not yours and not your children's friends. So the point isn't that they can only have perfect friends. The bottom line is simply that you do not want your children around people or in environments that are going to undermine the values that you're teaching them at home.

He that walketh with wise men shall be wise: but a companion of fools shall be destroyed.—Proverbs 13:20

#### 3. WATCH THEIR SOCIAL MEDIA.

Social media is often a window into a young person's heart and can be a place where they reveal very private thoughts and even information that could hurt them in the future.

If you allow your child to have social media accounts, you need to be involved. You need to understand how it works, what their privacy settings are, who they are connecting with through it, and what they are saying.

The Internet is one of the most dangerous places in the world to allow your child to simply find their own way with no parental oversight. (This is why there are two entire chapters in my book, *Making Home Work*, on navigating through the challenges of media.)

For ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord: walk as children of light...And have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them.—Ephesians 5:8, 11

#### 4. BE INVOLVED WITH THE AUTHORITIES IN THEIR LIVES.

Know your children's teachers, Sunday school teachers, youth pastor and workers, coaches, and anyone who is an authority in their lives. And help your child get to know them as well.

Invite them over for dinner, make effort to see them at church, ask them specifically how your child is doing.

Children need a united front between their authorities. Don't allow your children to pit you against another authority. If you ever have a concern regarding how one of your child's authorities is handling a situation, go directly to that person, and work out the difficulty between the two of you. Also, be sure your children's authorities always know you are available for any concerns they have and that you will listen to and believe what they tell you, even if it is that your child is struggling in a way you did not see.

He that refuseth instruction despiseth his own soul: but he that heareth reproof getteth understanding. —Proverbs 15:32

#### 5. SET THE RIGHT EXAMPLE.

The greatest gift you can give your children is a good example. If what you tell them does not match what you show them, they are likely to reject what you tell them.

No parent is perfect (and no child expects his parent to be perfect). But every parent is an example. If you want your child to love God, engage in the body life of the church, develop character, respect authorities, and invest their lives in eternal values, don't leave it to the youth group to teach them. Model these in your own life.

Children do what children see and especially what they see in their parents.

Be ye followers of me, even as I also am of Christ.—1 Corinthians 11:1

Parenting children can be difficult and is definitely challenging. But in the difficult moments, look further than the immediate problem in front of you to the long-range goal of seeing your children walk in truth.

Ultimately, each person will make their own choice regarding the direction they take for their life. But, as a parent, make sure that what you are doing today contributes toward directing your children to walk in truth...for a lifetime.

I have no greater joy than to hear that my children walk in truth.—3 John 4

# The Antelope Valley's Premiere K-12 Music Program

ancaster Baptist School offers the premiere music program in the Antelope Valley. Miss Andrea Zarate, the director of music at Lancaster Baptist School, received her Master of Church Music in 2017 from West Coast Baptist College and has served at the school for the past five years. She began her music education at a young age and sees the necessity for music in the elementary age student. Studies have revealed that students in elementary schools with superior music education programs score 22 percent higher in English and 20 percent higher in math on standardized tests. The music program at LBS is focused to develop the students in music but also to help them become a better student.

Beginning in first grade, students at LBS are taught the fundamentals of music according to California State Standards through their music theory and choir classes. Research has indicated when children are involved in a music program, their brain works differently than that of a non-musician. The students enrolled in the Advanced Placement Music Theory class have received high scores allowing them to begin at a higher level of music theory in college. The students of LBS are taught to have a love for music and the use their abilities and talents to honor the Lord.

Part of the music education students receive is through the annual West Coast Baptist College Fine Arts Competition. Every year at Fine Arts, the elementary choir has amazed the judges because of their size and ability to sing with passion. The foundations that the students learn in the elementary continue into the secondary music program as well. The large and small high school ensemble regularly receive high ratings from the judges at this competition. Mr. Fred Kearney, a music teacher at LBS, has encouraged



the students to sing from their heart, and it is evident when you watch any of the groups he has coached sing on any platform. The orchestra and band program also receive high ratings at this competition under the direction of Mr. Stephen Voshall and Miss Zarate.

The students who graduate from the music program of Lancaster Baptist School have usually participated in every aspect of the program whether they learned the violin in fifth grade or sang in the choir as a senior. A 2015 graduate said, "I was challenged to strive for excellence and reflect God's glory in my music." A current parent of LBS said, "Music is essential in the life of a Christian. You don't even know what you are missing out on until you learn and use it. When your children grow up, they will be so thankful that you gave them the opportunity to learn." The goal of the music program at Lancaster Baptist School is to teach students to love music and to ultimately use their abilities for Christ.

Both choirs join together for various events throughout the school year, but specifically for the Great Americans program.

#### **Secondary Choir**

Students in 7th-12th grades participate in the choral program for the entire school year. The junior high students learn to develop their abilities as their voices change, and confidence in singing is encouraged. The senior high students may choose to take a choral class as an elective, but many students choose to take the class because of their love of music.

#### **Secondary Ensemble**

Ensemble classes are divided by junior high and senior high with a focus placed on developing students' voices in a small group setting.

#### **Music Theory Class**

Students at LBS receive specific music theory training in lower elementary, throughout their band and orchestra classes, and at the secondary level.

#### **INSTRUMENTAL CLASSES**

#### **Recorder Class**

Third grade is introduced to playing an instrument. Students follow the Recorder Karate program to earn their karate "belts" based on the songs they learn on the recorder.

#### String Orchestra & Concert Band

Students in 4th-12th grade have the opportunity to participate in the band program to learn a brass, woodwind, or percussion instrument or participate in the orchestra to learn violin, viola, cello, or string bass. Classes are divided by playing ability in the elementary, but in the secondary all students are combined together. Secondary students have the opportunity to play in the Pep Band and compete in the WorldStrides program.

#### **VOCAL CLASSES**

#### **Elementary Ensemble**

Students in 4th-6th grade may audition for the elementary ensemble. This class develops the concepts the students are learning in choir by helping students become better singers in a small group setting. Students in this ensemble perform together at various events throughout the school year.

#### **Elementary Choir**

The elementary choir is divided into two sections: lower elementary (1st-3rd) and upper elementary (4th-6th). The lower elementary choir primarily focuses on the development of the student's singing voice. Students in lower elementary choir learn the basics of solfège, singing from their diaphragm, and correct word pronunciations. The upper elementary choir builds on their skills as a singer as they develop their ability to sight sing, read sheet music, and sing in harmony with each other.

# The Benefits of Art in Christian Education

ancaster Baptist School strives to minister to the whole student: physically, mentally, socially, and spiritually. In fact, one of our expected schoolwide learner outcomes (ESLOs) is to Achieve

Comprehensive Development. The goal of balanced growth can be achieved by providing extracurricular opportunities for students. LBS has a quality music and athletics program and over the last several years has endeavored to provide a quality studio art program to help our students experience the benefits of art.

One of the benefits of having an art program is to inspire students to discover their talents. The basic truth is that every student has been blessed with his own Godgiven talents, skills, and abilities. Many times, a student's artistic abilities lay dormant because they have not had an opportunity to explore them. While the emphasis at school can often be on grades and core subjects, an art program helps to draw out the undiscovered artistic talents in each student.

Another benefit of an art program is developing creativity. God is the Creator. He created the world and everything we see, touch, taste, and smell. Learning to express creativity is one way that students can learn more about the nature of the God we serve. One of the events in which the art students partake is an international event called Inktober. During the entire month of October, the students are given daily art prompts; the requirement is that the prompts must be completed only in ink. This helps students to get creative using only one medium. Another fascinating project that the students create is sculptures made of only clear packing tape. Some students even went to the extent of creating full body sculptures out of tape! These fun and exciting projects help the students to use their minds to think creatively.

Additionally, an art program helps to develop problem solving skills. Certain projects during the year require the students to solve problems while using different mediums to create art. For instance, one of the problems that the students solved was how to make their clay sculpture stand on its own. This was accomplished by using wires and even nails to help their structures stand.

Aside from discovering and developing talents, the art program also helps students understand how art can be used to enhance the lives of others. Students have been able to apply the skills they learn at school by being involved in face painting for special church events and in decorating for special school events such as Spirit Week and Homecoming.

Lastly, students can hone their skills in art class by using what they have learned and applying it to life. In our Fine Arts competition, students are challenged to compete with others and become better in art. Many students can use their skills to create amazing projects for academic classes and many continue after high school for careers like architecture, design, education, and photography.

The biggest goal for the LBS art program is for students to be confident in creating art, whether that be for a class assignment or for a competition. It is not so that they can leave class saying "Wow, look at what I can create!" but rather "Wow, look at what God can do through me!"

# WHAT DO STUDENTS NEED MOST? DESIRE BAR BE

THREE KEYS TO LIFE-LONG MOTIVATION FOR STUDENTS

**OVER THE LAST COUPLE OF YEARS** the news has reported increased outbreaks of dangerous diseases. First there was the Ebola Virus in Central Africa. Then came the Zika Virus in South America. These contagious diseases are worrisome to say the least, but there is an even greater epidemic at play inside the United States. This "disease" has infected almost every educational institution in America. Unlike Ebola or Zika, this "disease" is not a major health concern, but it does have drastic effects on the character, education, and achievement of our youth. What is it you ask? It is the disease of **improper motivation**. To put it more succinctly, it is the "entitlement mentality" that has crept into every aspect of our society and educational system.

This "disease" manifests itself in various ways. It could be the well-intentioned Sunday school teacher who passes out copious amounts of candy for a correct answer or for a memory verse well recited. It could be the school principal who awards every student in the school on awards night. It could also be the school teacher who inflates grades to reward effort instead of academic mastery. Whatever the source, the philosophy and the long-term results are the same. The philosophy is one, whether consciously or unconsciously, that promotes a selfish "what's in it for me" mentality. The long-term results are undisciplined students who like rewards but hate work.

These are not the students we want to build. Rather, we want self-motivated and self-disciplined leaders. We want students who have a life-long motivation and a love for Christ and learning.

So, how can you develop life-long motivation for education in your students?

#### 1. MASTERY.

Being competent at something exceptionally motivating. is Unfortunately, competency is not automatic. Oftentimes, it requires hard work, failure, and "stick-toitiveness." The Bible teaches us to be self-disciplined. First Corinthians 9:25 says "every man that striveth for the mastery is temperate in all things .... " When children first learn to ride a bike, they often fall, skin their knees, or even try to quit, but when they master it they want to do it all day, every day. It's thrilling to have mastered an important new skill! People will resist and avoid activities which they think they're bad at doing. Whether it's writing, baseball, or violin lessons, when people think they're noticeably worse than their peers at doing some activity, they don't want to do it. They're likely to feel embarrassed or

ashamed and to complain that the activity is "stupid and boring." This doesn't mean that they should stop doing it. On the contrary, there are some things students must do; there are requirements they must meet.

Sometimes, the answer is to increase students' competence by addressing skills gaps, learning disabilities or attention issues, but more commonly students need help understanding how to become competent (how to take notes, pay attention in class, and how to stay organized). An article from *PBS Parents* suggests that parents should:

**Emphasize strategy.** Students can benefit from learning study strategies. For instance, studying for a test by actively doing math problems works better than passively glancing over notes. Focusing on strategy gives students a path toward competence.

**Clarify the criteria.** It's discouraging for students when they try hard but then hear, "You did it all wrong!" or "You skipped a big part!" If your students tend to jump in without reading the directions, going over the instructions or grading rubric together before they begin work can prevent tears and wasted effort. Encourage your student to circle or underline key instructions and to check off completed parts of projects, so nothing gets missed.

**Point to progress.** Seeing their own progress helps students feel capable. Break down big tasks into

smaller steps so your students can see movement toward the goal. "Only one more section left!" Tell stories about times when your child struggled initially and then triumphed. You could say, "You used to have trouble with those kinds of problems, but now you really understand them!"

#### 2. AUTONOMY.

Sometimes students are unmotivated because they feel they're being forced to do something. Now, giving students total freedom to do only what they want to do is incredibly short-sighted (discipline is doing what must be done when it needs to be done whether we like it or not), but we can minimize resistance by allowing some independence. Again, *PBS Parents* suggests:

Offer choices. Giving students some say in how they do a task increases their motivation to do it. Let your student choose between equally acceptable alternatives. This or that? Now or later? Stick to just two or three options, because more can be overwhelming. Give a rationale that makes sense to your student. It's easier for students to do things when they understand why they need to do them. Students often complain, "Why do I have to learn this stuff that I'm never going to use?" One possible answer is "Because it gives you a chance to practice skills you'll use throughout your life, such as getting your work done efficiently, getting information to stick in your head, and working with others."

**Encourage problem solving.** The best solutions to motivation problems often come from students themselves. In a calm moment, ask your student, "What do you think would help you get this done?" You may have to be persistent to encourage your student to move beyond complaints toward making a plan.

#### 3. PURPOSE.

God created every student and every life for a purpose. Ephesians 2:10 tells us "For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them." Purpose is understanding that you are working for something larger than yourself. Oftentimes when we are discouraged in life it is because we have lost a sense of purpose. Why am I here? Why am I doing this? What is the point? Without a proper reason we may just give in and quit. You can help; try to:

**Paint the big picture.** Encourage your students by always connecting their academic tasks to the bigger picture of God's will. Talk with them about their goals for the future and show them how their work now is paving the way to those goals.

**Provide perspective.** As your students get older, take them to events at arenas bigger than the one they are currently in. If they are in elementary school, take them to the middle school to see what it is like. As your students get older, plan trips to college days and job fairs to give them a taste of what lies ahead. This can provide lots of motivation to achieve more where they are now.

**Connect them to the Bible.** Show your students from the Bible how we are to work "as unto the Lord."

#### \*\*\*

Focusing on temporary incentives will only produce selfinterested and undisciplined students who ask, "What's in it for me?" We want to develop self-disciplined and life-long motivated students. These are the leaders we need for the future. Focusing on mastery, autonomy, and purpose will help them to achieve this mark.

# Growing in Technology

echnology is all around us. In many places, like in our computers, our phones, and our cars, we expect it. Yet, in many vocations, it often comes as a surprise (care givers need to track patients, cooks need to track inventory and manage bulk orders, receptionists need to handle text, phone, email, and social media). No area today is left untouched by technology; it is present and needed everywhere.

Traditionally, students obtained a classical education and were prepared for a large set of job opportunities. Today, that is often no longer the case. Even the most basic retail job involves using a computer terminal, understanding internet connectivity, and having a basic understanding of how a customer connects to a company's website. Even payment often requires the use of a connection with a phone to online banks. Preparing students to use these technologies in a structured and safe manner is the

responsible approach to the inevitable engagement of students with technology. They can be taught how to use it for good or they can be used by it, unawares. Teaching technology in a responsible manner in today's world is a requirement for every parent and school today.

To meet this need, Lancaster Baptist School has implemented the course "Introduction to Technology." This course is designed to give students the skills required for basic computer use as well as a general understanding of technology. Students are given a brief overview of basic computer concepts and are provided basic information on computer hardware, memory, multimedia, storage, networks, and application software. We accomplish this by teaching the students the following:

- How to troubleshoot basic technological difficulties
- How to apply learned skills to school projects
- How to protect their identity and files from attack
- How to discern what technology products are best to fit needs
- How to understand how to create presentations, charts, spreadsheets, and documents on a computer

As technology continually changes, so must the abilities of our students. They must learn how to discern proper use of technology and how to prevent its misuse. Our hope is that this course will enable that goal. I look forward to working with the school's technology development commitment to improve the responsive use of technology at LBS.

# Growing in Student Success

very student has a Godgiven purpose. We believe it is our duty at LBS to provide each student with the tools they need as they seek to fulfill this purpose.

As is the case in many schools, one of the challenges we are faced with is providing an education to struggling students. Some of our struggling students have defined specific learning disabilities, while others have academic gaps they are working to bridge. The LBS Student Success Strategy has been designed by our team to address such concerns. This strategy will provide consistency throughout the student's years at LBS and provide an environment that fosters academic growth for each student. The Student Success Strategy was created with one goal in mind—to see every student achieve academic success.

As educators, we sometimes ask the question, "What is academic success?" Academic success can be defined in many ways, by different people. Students, teachers, and parents view student success through their own filter of expectations and experiences. Some may be tempted to measure success only through academic performance, such as grades. Others may view academic success as the acquiring and retention of knowledge. At LBS, we believe that a student's academic success is measured by their overall personal and academic growth. We are confident that the plan we have laid out will empower and equip our staff and faculty to better assist our struggling students by providing accurate assessment, proper placement, early intervention, adequate resources, and referrals to specialists, as needed.

Prior to admission, every new incoming student completes an entrance exam and is placed in the appropriate grade and/or classes. At that time, accommodations and modifications are put into place. Regular reassessment and adjustments are made to measure progress and ensure continued proper placement. For new and existing students struggling in core areas such as reading and math, early intervention is provided. Early intervention may be in the form of a reading group, phonics group, or online program that helps the student bridge gaps in areas such as math and spelling. Tutoring is made available for students in the form of peer-tutoring, one-on-one tutoring, before or after school tutoring, and help classes. In the near future, we expect to provide a private tutoring service made up of well-screened, qualified West Coast Baptist College students.

At the helm of the Student Success Program is the student success coordinator, who helps implement the success strategy. The coordinator acts as a liaison between the principal, teacher, student, and parent(s), and is charged with the task of seeing the plan through. The coordinator maintains consistent communication between past and present teachers, as well as teachers and administrators. As part of the effort to provide students with resources that are conducive to a positive learning environment, we have created the Student Success Room. This area is a quiet and comfortable room that promotes learning. It is available for students to use as they work with tutors or the coordinator; additionally, it provides access to computers for online help tools.

An Individualized Education Plan (IEP) is set into motion to assure students' success in the classroom. The IEP outlines goals, accommodations, and modifications. It also includes any areas that need to be corrected either in class or at home. These areas may include diet, home routine, room placement, auditory and visual concerns, as well as other minor adjustments that need to be altered to set the student up for success. The IEP is agreed upon by the IEP team, which consists of the assistant principal, student success coordinator, and the parents. Adjustments are made to the plan throughout the year and in the years to follow, as the student grows and learns the skills necessary to face and overcome challenges.

Early diagnosis, intervention, and providing modifications are extremely important for the success of the struggling student. God has a purpose for every life, and at LBS it is our mission to provide an environment where each student can overcome their obstacles and fulfill their God-given purpose in life in order to make an impact on this world for Jesus Christ.

To accomplish this outcome, we provide students with service opportunities, students leadership roles, and ministry internships.

Students have multiple opportunities to serve at Lancaster Baptist School. As a school, we have scheduled times to write various groups of people to encourage them. In the fall, the entire student body writes letters to veterans, thanking them for serving our country. Around major holidays, secondary students partner with our church youth to encourage widows by writing notes and delivering pies. In the elementary, students sing at veteran's homes at different points throughout the year. In the secondary, students in specific classes participate in studentdriven service projects that include washing cars, cleaning classrooms, and providing snacks for staff. In each of these areas, we desire our students to learn to serve with the mind of Christ, not looking to advance their reputation, but to humbly serve the Lord.

Students are also provided with opportunities to engage in leadership roles. Some areas in which we encourage students to lead are participating in student council and campus jobs. The student council is a student-elected group that have the offices of president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and class representatives. These students direct and lead in several school-wide events and opportunities:

- Opening Day for the fall semester banners, school mascot, and the "Boo-Hoo Breakfast" for Kindergarten parents
- "See You at the Pole"—a time of prayer at the school flag pole
- Spirit Week—fun activities leading up to Homecoming
- Reading weekly chapel announcements
- National Day of Prayer—school-wide prayer at the school's flag pole
- Pep Rallies

Students may also volunteer for campus jobs throughout the week. The following are some jobs in which they serve:

- Traffic Monitors—these young men help the traffic flow during arrival
- Teacher's Aids—juniors and seniors aid teachers in filing, making copies, and listening to children read and recite their math facts
- Safety Chain Crews—closing the traffic flow at the start of school
- Classroom Jobs—radio crews for dismissal, recess equipment managers, and other classroom responsibilities

- Peer Tutoring—students who use their study hall to help other students who are struggling in an academic area
- Audio/Visual Crew—managing microphones, slide shows, and music for chapel and pep rallies

Lastly, students are given an opportunity to serve through ministry internships. Students in their junior or senior year are given the opportunity to register for classes that involve internships in other departments on campus. Currently, these areas include assisting in a preschool class, serving in the Great Awakening Coffee Shop, and assisting our technology department. They learn the duties required in these departments and assist staff members to accomplish specific tasks.

In the future, we would like to provide even more opportunities for students to get involved in service by logging volunteer hours, Bible classes visiting nursing homes, and encouraging missionary children by corresponding with them through letters, packages, and social media.

Pastor Chappell recently tweeted, "There is no better exercise for the heart than stooping down to lift others." Students will learn to serve by watching others around them joyfully serve in their areas and being given the opportunities to serve others. Serving others is the Christian way of life!

## HISTORY
